Developing a SUNY-wide Transliteracy Learning Collaborative to Promote Information and Technology Collaboration supported access to non-credit opportunities by bringing together a number of SUNY librarians, faculty members, and an administrator who focused on promoting metaliteracy (rather than transliteracy) and the 21st century competencies involved. The work accomplished and the collaborations formed during this early IITG-funded project led to the development of learning objectives for metaliteracy, an informational website, and, ultimately, open learning resources, including a robust digital badging system (<https://metaliteracybadges.org>) and two MOOCs (for more information, see Designing Innovative Online Learning: Integrating a Coursera MOOC with Open SUNY Badging <http://commons.suny.edu/iitg/view/project-view/entry/412/>).

Developing a SUNY-wide Transliteracy Learning Collaborative to Promote Information and Technology Collaboration increased understanding of metaliteracy by SUNY faculty through an enhanced online presence, a Conversations in the Disciplines conference, and presentations at other conferences. In addition, the learning objectives for metaliteracy were edited based on feedback from SUNY educators. This enhanced knowledge of and appreciation for metaliteracy will have affected teaching done by professors and librarians familiar with metaliteracy.

The creation of all the Metaliteracy components and concomitant spaces to engage with our colleagues provides a robust learning environment that facilitates student inquiry. The Metaliteracy Collaborative is a SUNY-wide group that allows for inquiry on multiple levels through the creation of the metaliteracy learning objectives, the supporting papers and presentations, and the technologies, all of which led to building curriculum around metaliteracy in 3 MOOC formats and a badging system. Although designed for SUNY, there has been interest in this work beyond SUNY and the state. The work of the Collaborative has informed national conversations, including the 2015 ACRL Information Literacy Framework for Higher Education. significant change at SUNY institutions and national organization. There has been a direct impact from this grant to national change.

This new platform will allow more SUNY institutions to take advantage of this open content. It will also support the work being done on a current IITG Tier 3 project, Scaling the Metaliteracy Badging System for Open SUNY: Collaborative Customization for Teacher Education Programs.
